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## PA-X: the Peace Agreements Database - Terms of Use

The PA-X website (<https://www.peaceagreements.org/>) is the website of the peace agreement access tool, currently hosting the PA –X Peace Agreement Database, PA-X Women and Gender Database, and PA-X Local Database (“the Databases”).

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The PA-X Tracker: the Peace and Transition Process Tracker (“the website”: <https://pax.peaceagreements.org/tracker/>) is hosted by the PA-X website, University of Edinburgh, and is produced and maintained by the Peace and Conflict Resolution Evidence Platform (PeaceRep) team at the University of Edinburgh Law School.
